These are the types of questions and issues we will explore in Philosophy...

#### **Epistemology**

What is knowledge? Is colour mind independent? Do we possess any innate knowledge? Is there any knowledge that is beyond reasonable doubt?

#### **Ethics**

Is happiness the only thing in life worth working for? Should we follow absolute moral rules? Is moral language based in objective fact? Is euthanasia moral?

#### **Metaphysics of Mind**

Are the mind and body distinct? What is consciousness? Artificial Intelligence

### **Metaphysics of God**

Can we prove the existence of God? The Problem of Evil. Is religious language meaningless?

## **Entry Requirements**

- **Skills**: Critical thinking skills of the highest level. The cut and thrust of philosophical argument and debate. The ability to engage in deep reflection. The courage to question and challenge accepted ways of thinking. The skills of independent thinking. teamwork, confidence and social skills.
- Interests: An interest in life's big philosophical and ethical issues would certainly help!
- Qualifications: A strong pass is RE is recommended because of the difficulty of the subject. However no prior knowledge is assumed.
