- Non-Examined Assessment (NEA) (60%): Four controlled assessment coursework units (F092, F093, F096, F097).

F090	Principles of Health and Social Care This unit provides the foundational knowledge for working in the sector. Topics include: Equality, Diversity, and Rights in care settings. Key Legislation and policies (e.g., Equality Act, Children Act). Managing Hazards, Health & Safety procedures. Best Practice including the roles, responsibilities, and values of care professionals (e.g., the 'Six Cs').	External (Exam) 1.5 hours
F092	Person-centred Approach to Care This unit explores the values and practices that underpin personalised care. Topics include: The Person-Centred Approach context and principles. Meeting Needs and Providing Support for individuals' physical, emotional, social, and intellectual needs. Communication Skills for effective personcentred care. Ethical Issues in personalising care.	Internal NEA 15%
F093	Supporting People with Mental Health Conditions This unit provides knowledge about mental health and how to support individuals effectively. Topics include: Definitions and Views of Mental Health. Exploring the main Mental Health Conditions and their impact. Provision of Mental Health Services (e.g., NHS, third sector). Treatment and Support options.	Internal NEA 15%

Unit	Topics/Unit Title	Assessment
F091	Exam unit, covering the structure and function of the human body. This is the second mandatory exam unit, covering the structure and function of the human body. Topics include: Cardiovascular System. Respiratory System. Digestive System. Musculoskeletal System. Control and Regulatory Systems (Nervous, Endocrine, Urinary). Reproductive System.	External (Exam) 1.5 hours

F096	Supporting People in Relation to Sexual Health, Pregnancy and Postnatal Health This unit focuses on key aspects of reproductive and sexual health. Topics include: Sexual Health (relationships, consent, law). Contraception and STIs. Pregnancy and Birth (antenatal and perinatal care). Postnatal Health (support for parents and new-borns).					
F097	Supporting Healthy Nutrition and Lifestyles This unit covers the essential role of diet and physical activity in promoting health. Topics include: Healthy Eating Guidelines and a balanced diet. Nutritional Labelling. Physical Activity Guidelines for different age groups. The Impact of Lifestyle on health issues.					
Combination Pathway		A combination of 2 A levels and BTEC L3 Health and Social Care 5 You will need: 5 grade 5's including English & Maths. A level 4 or above in science would be desirable too.
